“Youth Apprenticeship Pays Off”

Heather has participated in the Youth Apprenticeship Program (YAP) as an apprentice at Northeast Georgia Medical Center for two semesters. As a part of her responsibilities, she has had the opportunity to rotate through eight departments at the hospital. According to Heather, Physical Therapy was by far her favorite. She said she was inspired by the patients in the 4 West Rehabilitation Center.



When asked how this program has helped her, Heather replied, “It was awesome! I actually got to work side by side with real doctors and nurses. The YAP experience has exposed me to the reality of the healthcare field and has made me realize I really want to be a part of it. I feel that my participation in this program helped with my decision to apply at Emory as well as with the whole application process. “Catoosa County Youth Apprenticeship”

For many years Catoosa County has developed a dynamic Youth Apprenticeship Program (YAP) providing work-based learning experience for seniors at Ringgold High School and Lakeview/Ft. Oglethorpe High School. Catoosa County celebrated the success of all 60 YAP students at their Annual Awards Luncheon held at the Ringgold Depot on Thursday, May 4th 2006. The theme of the luncheon was the “Railroad Crossing” of Scholastics and the World of Work highlighting the seniors’ transition of secondary studies to post-secondary and work-related opportunities available to the students. The YAP students’ journey does not end with the Awards Luncheon. They will be tracked for the next several years by the Youth Apprenticeship Coordinator, David Beard, as they complete 2000 hours of work in their chosen career path as well as a post-secondary credential. The luncheon also highlighted the new Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) satellite training program scheduled to begin in the fall of 2006 at Catoosa County’s own Performance Learning Center (PLC) located near the Chickamauga Battlefield. TVA “School-to-Work” coordinators Jim Kurtz and Bill Myers were also present to help acknowledge the new program which will be housed at the PLC with TVA providing supervisory personnel and equipment used in YAP student training. Two hundred and eighty-seven marketing students and DECA members along with sixty-nine DECA advisors/chaperones from Georgia attended the 60th Annual National DECA 2006 International Career Development Conference in Dallas, Texas on April 29 – May 2. Students experienced a time of competing, participating in leadership academies, attending workshops and seminars, campaigning, going to the rodeo, sightseeing, etc.

Competitors from around the world were tested on their skill and proficiency in various career and skill areas through managerial decision-making role plays or their skills were measured through their development of a 30-page business plan and an oral defense of their research and conclusions to business professionals. Industry icons, like Foot Locker, Art Institute, J.C. Penney, etc., helped DECA identify the skills that were tested and judged at the DECA's competitive events.

DECA's renowned Competitive Events Program uses role-play events, comprehensive tests, online simulations and written projects to evaluate the academic and job skills their members develop in their marketing education classes, workplace experiences and through the DECA activities. Both the education and business communities recognize these skill sets as essential for future success.
