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Definition



Assistive Technology Device

Section 300.5 Assistive technology device.

Any item, piece of equipment or product system, whether acquired commercially off the shelf, modified, or customized, that is used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of a child with a disability.

The term does not include a medical device that is surgically implanted, or the replacement of such device.

(Authority 20 U.S.C. 1401(1))





Assistive Technology Service

Section 300.6 Assistive technology service. Any service that directly assists a child with a disability with the selection, acquisition, or use of an assistive technology device. The term includes-

 (a) The evaluation of the needs of a child with a disability, including a functional evaluation of the child in the child's customary environment;







Assistive Technology Service

Section 300.8 (continued)

- (b) Purchasing, leasing, or otherwise providing for the acquisition of assistive technology devices by children with disabilities;
- (c) Selecting designing, fitting, customizing, adapting, applying, retaining, repairing, or replacing assistive technology devices;
- (d) Coordinating and using other therapies, interventions, or services with assistive technology devices, such as those associated with existing education and rehabilitation plans and programs;





Assistive Technology Service

Section 300.8 (continued)

- (e) Training or technical assistance for a child with a disability or, if appropriate, that child's family; and
- (f) Training or technical assistance for professionals (including individuals or rehabilitation services), employers, or other individuals who provide services to employ, or are otherwise substantially involved in the major life functions of children with disabilities.

(Authority 20 U.S.C. 1401(2))










District Legal Obligations



Legal Obligation

Once assistive technology devices and services are documented in the IEP, then the school district is ultimately responsible for providing the identified assistive technology needs. The device and/or service must be provided at no cost to the family.






Legal Obligation

IDEA: Purchasing, leasing, or otherwise providing for the acquisition of assistive technology devices by children with disabilities;





Obtaining Assistive Technology



- Typically need to use federal, state, local, and/or building level funds to build core classroom inventory
- Planned, thoughtful purchases versus ondemand, individual student purchases
- Determine a purchasing plan based on district special education population

Purchases implemented over time

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- Generally more cost effective
 - Low to mid tech rather than high tech at this point
 - Bulk purchase may reduce cost
- Builds access to more tools system wide





- Student benefits of core equipment within a classroom
 - Increased acceptance of AT
 - Increased student use of AT
 - Increased active participation in academic tasks
 - Increased student independence





- Teacher benefits of core equipment within a classroom
 - Increased acceptance of AT as a learning tool
 - Facilitates ongoing assessment and evaluation of students' need for additional AT
 - Increased ease of integrating technology into daily teaching strategies







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Core Classroom Inventory Preschool

Core Classroom Inventory Preschool Special Education

This document contains information on the range of assistive technology equipment that is appropriate for most preschool special education classrooms. Many of these devices support increased productivity and independence at an early age. In most instances, students use a combination of assistive technology devices to meet a range of needs. The types of assistive technology devices used to support recreation and leisure, communication, computer access, daily living aids, mobility and seating and positioning are determined by individual student needs as well as the required tasks across all instructional environments.

Core classroom technology is technology that is routinely required by students with disabilities in the classroom. Assistive technology should be available to meet the needs of **all** students enrolled in a classroom.







Borrow or Rent

 - Facilitating informed decision making prior to final purchase










Federal, State, Local Funds

- During budget planning, allocate funds for assistive technology
 - Make it a priority!
 - Have a plan to build assistive technology inventory in your district, and stick with it!









- If IEP team decides that a student needs a particular AT device/service, they may ask the parent if they would consider using their private insurance or Medicaid.
 - If the parent says no, the school system is still responsible to provide the device.
 - If the parent agrees and the claim is denied, it is still the school system's responsibility to provide the device
- Assistive Technology decisions are not contingent on availability of funding.



- For private health insurance, coverage is contingent on individual insurance plans
- Some assistive technology is often referred to as Durable Medical Equipment (DME) for funding purposes for both Medicaid and private health insurance
 - Report has to be written based on medical needs rather than educational needs
 - A physicians order is required



- Durable Medical Equipment (DME) (continued)
 - Generally covers high end AAC devices
 - Evaluation by certified/licensed SLP
 - Device will belong to student, not district
 - Generally not going to pay for academic and learning aids
 - May pay for access devices environmental control, ADLs





Funding Options

There are many funding options for AAC devices and services. It is important to review all applicable options and combine options where appropriate.Funding for the Initial AAC Evaluation: A formal AAC evaluation is usually required by the various funding agencies.

Private Insurance: Many private insurance carriers will fund an AAC evaluation. Prior authorization may be required. The specifics of what is needed (e.g., multidisciplinary report, prescription, invoice) will depend on your particular policy coverage. Your policy handbook should be your guide to understanding your covered services. It is likely that your private insurance company will be unfamiliar with AAC. Insurance companies tend to deny coverage if they do not perceive the evaluation as a "covered service." You may need to justify the evaluation as a medically necessary service before your private insurance agency will provide coverage.

Schools: Schools are required by law to provide appropriate assistive technology services. This can include augmentative devices, printers and computers that are necessary for your child to actively participate in class and to complete homework assignments. If your child's school does not have qualified service providers on staff to perform an evaluation, an outside evaluation should be conducted at the school's expense. The requirement for an AAC evaluation and the needed intervention services to facilitate the development of effective communication skills must be written into your child's Individual Education Plan (IEP).









- Student must be considered employable (determined by Voc Rehab Counselor)

Free Resources Reading

Free text reader that inserts a toolbar into MS Word – This add-in toolbar enables the user to have text in Word read by word, sentence, or paragraph. Students can use this add-in to read what they have written or to read digital or electronic text (e-text) that has been copied or opened in Word.

WordTalk – <u>www.wordtalk.org.uk</u> - WordTalk is a free program developed for use with all versions of Microsoft Word (from Word 97 upwards). It will speak the text of the document and will highlight it as it reads. It contains a talking dictionary to help decide which word spelling is most appropriate. It sits in the Word toolbar and is configurable, allowing the user to adjust the highlight colors, the voice and the speed of the speech. This program is easy to use, available in the word processing document and does not require the user to open a separate window. Download the **WTConfigure.exe** file along with the **WordTalk.exe** file as it enables the user to configure WordTalk so that the WordTalk toolbar opens in Word. It is suggested that the <u>documentation</u> at the website be downloaded before installing the program. It has troubleshooting help in case the toolbar does not show up in Word. Free text reader that requires the text to be converted to its format before it can be opened in the reader – These are free programs that displays text and one gives the user the capability to change the presentation of the text (font, text size, and background) while the other provides text-to-speech. Both have converters that can change a text file to its format.

eReader – <u>www.ereader.com</u> – eReader.com is an electronic book publisher that offers contemporary fiction and non-fiction books, newspapers, and magazines for reading on handheld computers as well as Windows and Macintosh computers. If you want to convert text files to eReader format, then also download **DropBook for Windows**. DropBook for Windows allows you to convert a text file formatted using the Palm Markup Language (PML) into a Palm OS .pdb file which can be read with the eReader application.

Microsoft Reader - <u>www.microsoftreader.com</u> - Size of text may be customized. This program has bookmark and note taking capabilities. The user can choose to have the text read with highlighting
