# **Directors Elluminate December 1, 2010**

#### **Communities of Practice in Transition Institutes**

In conjunction with the National Secondary Transition Technical Assistance Center (NSTTAC), the Georgia Department of Education will present the first Communities of Practice in Transition Institutes. These sessions will include an overview of transition assessment and its requirements. Participants will spend time gaining a hands-on knowledge of various assessment instruments, reviewing reports from assessment instruments for different students, and then developing postsecondary goals (and the rest of the IEP) from these documents. The entire day will focus on the essential elements of transition assessment, which is the cornerstone of quality transition planning and services. All districts are invited to send representatives to this one day, drive-in professional learning opportunity. No registration fee is required, but districts will be responsible for substitutes and for participants' travel expenses. Please note that participants will be responsible for their own snacks and lunch and should plan accordingly. Please remember to register for only one session as these are repeated sessions. ## **Interpreter Training**

The University of Northern Colorado, Distance Opportunities for Interpreter Training Center, was awarded a 4-year grant (2010-2014) from the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs, to establish the Professional Educational Interpreter Project. The American Sign Language-English Interpretation program is an on-line baccalaureate degree program, with summer on-site requirements in Colorado.

This grant-funded project will sponsor BA students who are prepared to

- 1. engage in specified sophomore course work within the program,
- 2. select educational interpreting as their emphasis area, and
- 3. provide a 4-year service obligation in exchange for the \$20,000 OSEP scholarship.

Applications for the OSEP scholarship will be available when a student has been accepted into the ASL-English Interpretation program.

If a student does not complete the bachelor's degree within the two years of sponsorship, or does not provide four years of service to an IDEA-eligible student, he or she must repay all the OSEP monies expended on his or her education. The trend appears to be an increase in formal complaints and a decrease in due process hearings, with mediation requests holding relatively steady (although slightly declining) across the four years of data. This data can be the basis of further study and discussion, perhaps with an eye toward establishing and maintaining sound preventative measures that avoid and/or resolve conflicts in their informal, early stages of development. ## **Announcing New Autism Assessment Project (ANCA)**

## Assessing the Needs of Children with Autism (ANCA)

In response to requests from local districts, the Marcus Autism Center and the Georgia Department of Education are collaborating to offer training for selected staff to help meet the needs of children with ASDs in local schools effectively. This initiative will assist locally nominated educators in administering and using data from the ABLLS-R Assessments to guide the development of appropriate goals that are based on the individual needs of the learner.

Leading teachers, facilitators, and coordinators from eight educational regions will work directly with our consultants. The course material will be delivered via face-to-face instruction, telemedicine (video chat using a secure server), or webinars. Participants will be trained to

- administer and use the ABLLS-R to determine developmental needs and to plan appropriate instruction;
- assist others in utilizing the ABLLS-R assessment; and
- determine the appropriateness of other assessment tools.

After the first session, each participant will identify a student to work with for the remainder of the training. Participants will conduct assessments with this child and will develop goals and objectives based on these assessments.

Materials and competency measures for this child will be used throughout the training series, and the competency measures must be met by all participants. Attendance at all training sessions is necessary, since each training session builds on lessons from the previous session.

## **Selection and Registration of ANCA Participants**

It is recommended that two representatives from each school district who teach **mild, moderate, and low functioning students with autism,** and who have a foundational knowledge of Autism Spectrum Disorders, attend these meetings. Selected representatives should be capable of assisting with subsequent training for their school districts. Special education directors are encouraged to select project participants who can assist in building local program capacity. Registration for training dates and locations will be announced soon.
