- **Direct Costs** salaries, fringe benefits, purchased services, equipment and supplies.
- Indirect Costs "cost of doing business" such as accounting services - payroll and audits, purchasing, operation/maintenance of building – all utilities.

- No legal fees only staff development and for student services after a decision is reached
- No new construction only renovation to make facility accessible grab bars, ramps, carpet, acoustical tiles
- No buses but you can modify AC, lift, seat belts
- **No food/drinks** unless for instructional purposes or during normal meal time per agenda and no other opportunity is provided for lunch/dinner
- No awards/prizes for staff mugs, T-shirts, bags, etc.
- No political activities or lobbying
- No alcoholic beverages
- Generally, not for special education director's salary/benefits use QBE earning first and then local funds or prorate the difference for federal fund usage.

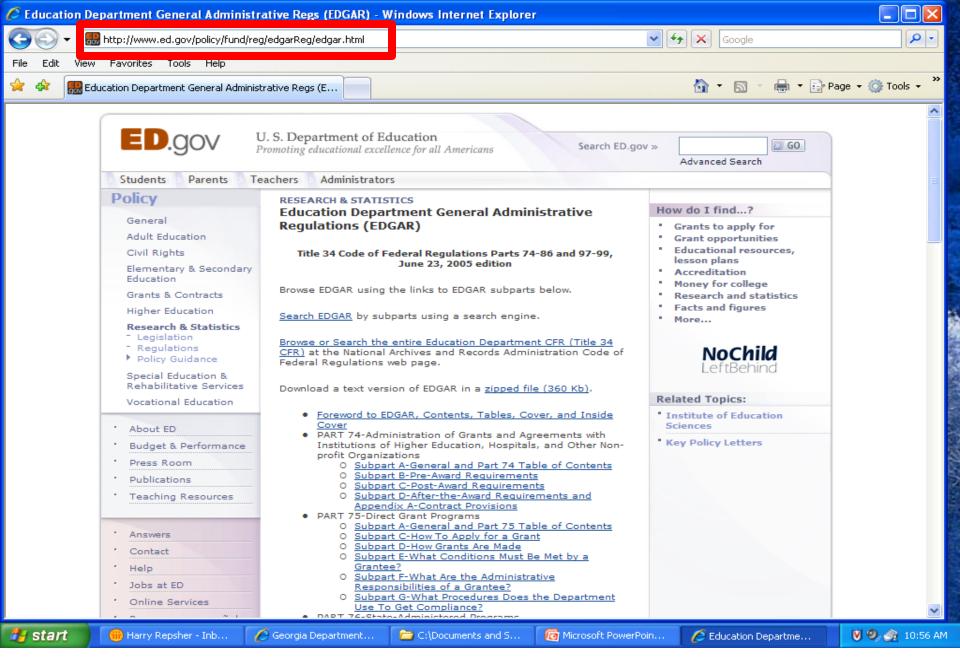

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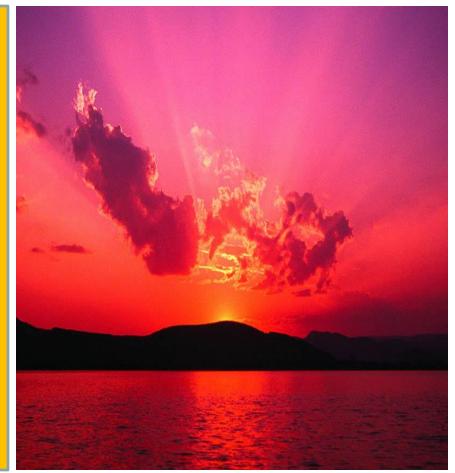

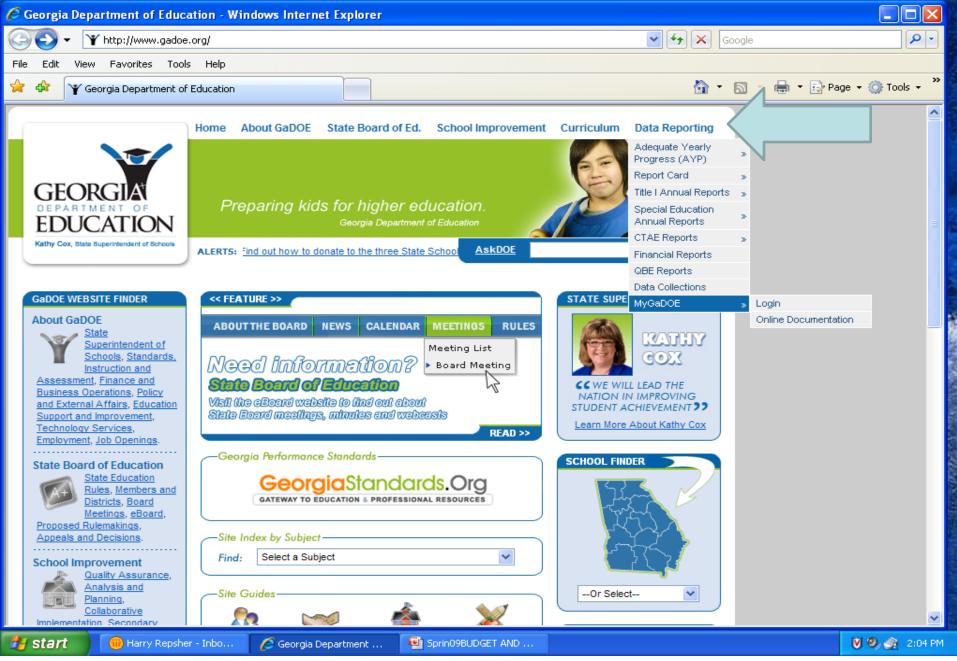

 - Use 09 expenditures to "0" out state and 08 carryover

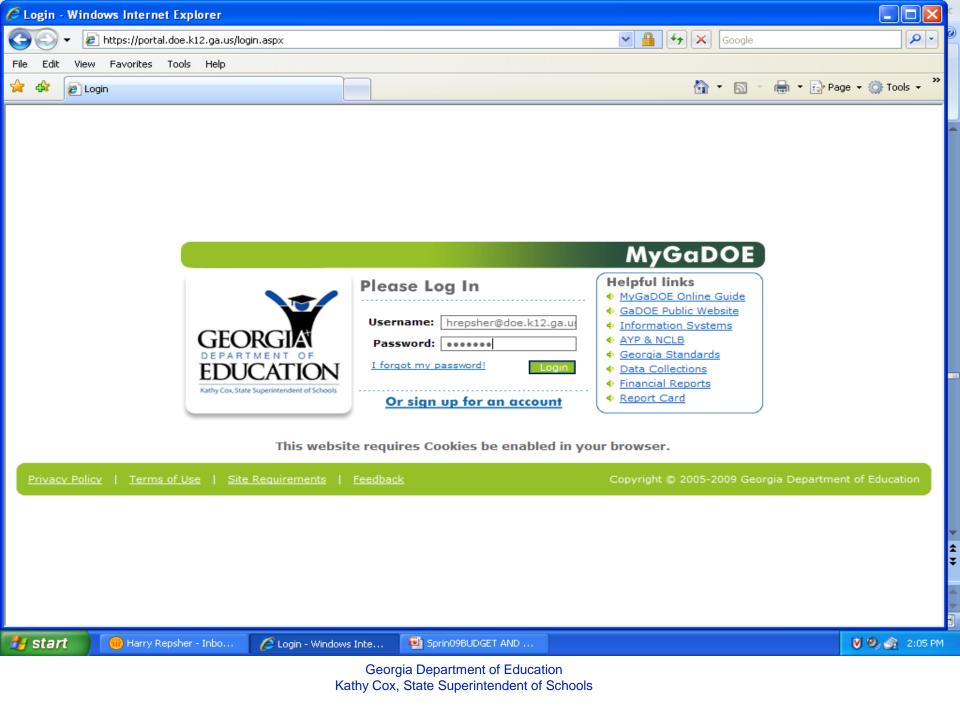
