

Formula Writing

A descriptive paragraph = one topic sentence + three detail sentences + one summary sentence.

Descriptive paragraph	Example	Your sentence
Topic sentence	My dog ís an otterhound.	
First detail sentence	Hís name ís Max, and he ís tan and gray.	
First detail sentence	Hís fur ís very wíry, and he sheds all over the house.	
First detail sentence	Líke all otterhounds, Max has webbed feet.	
Summary sentence	Max ís a very handsome dog.
