The ceiling was painted by Paul Cesar Helleu in 1912 and it shows constellations that are based on medieval celestial information.






A virtual tour within a virtual tour....

Rockefeller Center

Rockefeller Center was named after John D. Rockefeller, Jr. who leased the space from Columbia University in 1928 and developed it from 1930. It is a complex of 19 commercial buildings covering 22 acres between 48th and 51st streets. It was declared a National Historic Landmark in 1987.


Statue of Liberty – this link will take you to a photo gallery of the Statue

The Statue of Liberty was given to the U.S. by France. The official dedication ceremonies were held on October 28, 1886. The statue is over 305 tall from the base of the pedestal to the tip of the torch. The statue was open to the public again on July 4, 2009. Twenty lucky visitors were to be among the first to climb the 354 steps to the crown. This marks the first time visitors are allowed in the statue since the 9/11 attacks.
